A week in the life of a Liberty University School of Aeronautics flight instructor: (as described by Jeff)

It starts with a 0530 alarm on Monday morning for our 0630 CFI meeting. During this time we do a devotional, pray for our students, and spend some time reviewing items from flight line that need to be discussed. I currently fly with 6 students throughout the week: one private pilot applicant, 3 instrument applicants, and 2 commercial applicants. Three of them are headed to the mission field when they graduate. I am sincerely grateful for the opportunity that I have to be a part of such an amazing flight program here at Liberty.

God has blessed us with over 200 students, about 100 of which are flying regularly. As a program, we operate 9 Cessna 172SP Skyhawks, 3 Cessna 172 Kutlass RGs, I Piper Seminole, and I Piper Saratoga. With so many students and aircraft flying, we ask that you pray for the continued safety of all flights here at Liberty so that we can continue to send professional pilots into the aviation industry to be a witness for Christ.



A new era in missionary aviation—the Kodiak



We witnessed a historic event a few weeks ago when the first production Kodiak airplane visited Wichita during a nationwide tour. The Kodiak is the new airplane that the missionary aviation community is buzzing about. The Kodiak has been designed specifically for mission aviation by Quest Aircraft. It has a powerful turbine engine, special

wing design, rugged landing gear and a healthy ground clearance that will withstand remote and rugged grass and dirt airstrips. The Kodiak also uses jet fuel which is readily available and less expensive than aviation gasoline that has been increasingly expensive and hard to find worldwide.
